## **Medium Grant Guidelines**

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# 1.0 Introduction

## 1.1 About Lowitja Institute

Lowitja Institute is Australia's only national Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community controlled health research institute named in honour of its Patron, Dr Lowitja O'Donoghue AC CBE DSG. It is an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community controlled organisation working for the health and wellbeing of Australia's Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples through high-impact quality research, knowledge exchange, and by supporting a new generation of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander health researchers.

Established in January 2010, Lowitja Institute operates on key principles of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander leadership, a broader understanding of health that incorporates wellbeing, and the need for the work to have a clear and positive impact.

## 1.2 Lowitja Institute Members Community

Our vibrant and engaged Members Community is integral to creating research outcomes that centralise and amplify the voices of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. We welcome applications from individuals and organisations to join us as we continue to work towards realising [Dr Lowitja O'Donoghue's](#) vision.

Lowitja Institute offers a range of benefits to our valued Members Community which include connection, support and workforce development opportunities. We run events and professional development workshops throughout the year and provide access to a wide range of learning and educational resources.

## 1.3 Lowitja Institute's Research Agenda

Lowitja Institute's research is built on key priorities identified by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people. We aim to produce high-impact research, tools and resources that will have positive health outcomes for Australia's First Nations. The Institute facilitates engagement between Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities, tertiary education, medical research institutions, government, and partner organisations to maximise the impact of research, knowledge, and innovation. Importantly, the Institute drives our research agenda by ensuring that the research we commission is led and owned by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and communities.


We also engage with our Indigenous family around the world, facilitating networks and collaborations that improve the health and wellbeing of First Peoples globally.

Our research methods have been refined over more than 20 years. See our [Research web page](#) for more information.

Lowitja Institute's Research Agenda is underpinned by a rigorous approach to research that adheres to the Institute's research principles of:

- beneficence – to act for the benefit of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in the conduct of our research
- leadership by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people
- engagement of research end users (Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander organisations and communities, policymakers, other potential research users)
- development of the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander research workforce
- measurement of impact in improving Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people's health.


Lowitja Institute's Research Agenda 2024–26 aims to achieve positive health and wellbeing benefits for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples across four key themes:

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1. **Self-determination** – this theme seeks to uphold historical, contemporary and future truth-telling as a fundamental process for the decolonising of health and wellbeing policy and practice. Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people have the right to regain control to lead research and decision-making processes to contribute to social transformation throughout generations.
  2. **Sovereignty** – this theme seeks to acknowledge the political and intellectual sovereignty of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people. It upholds sovereignty in the political discourse including determining the agenda, the creation, governance, control, and protection of knowledge.
  3. **Cultural determinants** – this theme seeks to recognise the importance and relatedness of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultural determinants which includes our knowledge systems as integral part to strong health and wellbeing.
  4. **Racism** – this theme recognises the ongoing legacy of colonisation and the impacts on health, and healthcare delivery and access. It seeks to uphold Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander rights to culturally safe systems free of racism through privileging community-led solutions to policy development and implementation to health service management and delivery, research, education, and training, to improve health system quality and safety.

## 1.4 About the GLOWS Grant Program 2024–26

The Guiding Local Opportunities for Wellbeing (GLOWS) Grant Program 2024–26 offers scholarships and research grants to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community organisations, and their partners for work relating to HIV and viral hepatitis over the next three years. In partnership with [Gilead Sciences](#), Lowitja Institute aims to further increase health equity, address disparities that continue to drive disease transmission, and work towards elimination of HIV and viral hepatitis in all of our communities.

The GLOWS Grant Program 2024–26 aims to empower Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander researchers and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander organisations, to transform their ideas into aspirations that meet the needs of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples through a decolonised and intersectional approach to grants.



The program aims to support initiatives that align with at least one of the following funding priorities:

- **Prevention and education:** reforming and reinvigorating prevention strategies in HIV and viral hepatitis, while navigating racism and structures that act as barriers to disease prevention and education.
- **Individual and community agency:** supporting Indigenous-led organisations to strengthen skills, capabilities and infrastructure and ensure the ongoing sustainability of HIV and viral hepatitis services. Additionally, create opportunities to support individual personal development and agency to encourage the next generation of leaders and mentors.
- **Reformed health care:** dismantling structural barriers to improve access to HIV and viral hepatitis prevention and care services and building culturally safe and respectful environments for Indigenous people to navigate care.

Over the course of the program, five different grant types will be offered. These include large and medium grants, focused on providing opportunities for research and community programs aimed at addressing Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community needs. The program will also include incubator or seeding grants, scholarships, and education grants. Funding tiers will range from \$300,000 over one year, to seeding grants and scholarships of \$30,000 and \$25,000.

#### **1.4.1 GLOWS Medium Grant**

The aims of the GLOWS Medium Grant are to ensure that the research commissioned is of high impact for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, that it represents value for money, that the research is led and owned by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and has direct benefit to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples and communities.

Research funded through the GLOWS Medium Grant must address the overall goal of the program, being to increase health equity and address disparities that continue to drive the transmission of HIV/viral hepatitis within Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities and work towards elimination.

## GRANT VALUE, DURATION AND REQUIREMENTS

- The GLOWS Medium Grant value is up to \$300,000 the amount awarded will be assessed against criteria including, but not limited to, alignment with the GLOWS program objective.
- The number of GLOWS Medium Grants available may vary.
- The maximum project duration period is up to one year and funds are paid directly to the lead organisation.
- Acceptance of the grant is subject to the lead organisation and Lowitja Institute accepting and agreeing to all terms and conditions set out in the GLOWS Grant Contract and Agreement.
- Continuation of funding during the tenure of the grant is dependent on the recipient meeting key deliverables stipulated in the GLOWS Grant Contract and Agreement.

## 2.0 Before starting your application

The purpose of this grant guidelines document is to support the completion of the GLOWS Medium Grant application.

Before you begin your application, we recommend that you:

- read and understand the GLOWS Medium Grant Guidelines
- read and agree to the GLOWS Medium Grant Terms and Conditions
- review the application timeline as there will be no application extensions available
- download and review the [application checklist](#)

- ensure your organisation meets all Eligibility Criteria to apply for the grant and ensure you have addressed each of the application questions and uploaded all required documentation.

There are **six parts** to the GLOWS Medium Grant application to complete:

- 1. Eligibility and selection criteria** – Please read the eligibility and selection criteria.
- 2. Project details** – This includes your project proposal, ethics requirements, alignment with the GLOWS funding priorities, project milestones, risk management, and an outline of research teams roles, responsibilities and governance.
- 3. Knowledge translation** – This includes details of your approach to sharing and translating research findings for community, consideration of a future plan to develop the research further, attending and sharing results at the Lowitja Institute conference or with other platforms and key stakeholders.
- 4. Workforce capability** – Ensure your research project embeds Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander leadership including workforce capacity and capability building activities.
- 5. Budget** – Outlining research project activities including staff allocation, overall project budget, expenses, and the inclusion of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander workforce and resourcing.
- 6. Certification of application** – Your application must be certified by an authorised person at your organisation.

An application may be considered ineligible and excluded from further consideration if it does not meet all eligibility criteria as set out in the GLOWS Medium Grants terms and conditions of award.

## 2.1 GLOWS Medium Grant timeline

### 3.0 Selection criteria and assessment process

The 2025 GLOWS Medium Grant round is an open and competitive process.

All applicants will be assessed using a marking rubric that is outlined below. The process is designed to ensure project design excellence and rigour, as well as privileging Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander perspectives and high-impact projects.

The process includes:

- Once the funding round closes, applications will undergo internal assessment for eligibility.
- All eligible applications will progress to peer review by a panel, comprising of senior Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander researchers, Lowitja Institute staff and board members.
- Applications will be individually assessed and ranked based on the assessment criteria.
- Recommendations for funding will be considered and approved by the Lowitja Institute Board of Directors and the GLOWS Executive Committee.

**Successful and unsuccessful applicants will be notified in writing via email. It is important to note, all successful applications will have 10 business days from their email (including public holidays) to respond to Lowitja Institute advising of**

## acceptance of grant funds by signing the Acceptance of Conditional Offer.

If a successful applicant does not adhere to this timeframe, Lowitja Institute may withdraw the offer. Lowitja Institute may request advice or clarification from applicants at any time during the assessment process.

### 3.1 Selection criteria

Lowitja Institute will consider proposals that meet the following selection criteria:

- The application form has been completed in full with all supporting documentation uploaded correctly.
- The application demonstrates relevance to **ONE** of the GLOWS Program Funding Priorities and conveys how the idea addresses a clear aspiration and need for the organisation and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.
- The application demonstrates how the project outcome will generate meaningful impact and engagement, for example potential to build research capacity, Aboriginal workforce, stakeholder engagement and partnerships.
- The application demonstrates a feasible research project proposal and budget.

### 3.2 Assessment criteria

Applications are assessed by a panel of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander academics and community members against the criteria listed below:

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## 4.0 Completing the grant application process

To apply for the grant round, you will need to complete and submit your application through our SmartyGrants online application portal.

The SmartyGrants online portal requires frequent saving to keep your application as up to date as possible. It is recommended that every 10 minutes you save your submission and refresh the application portal.

It is the applicants' responsibility to ensure that the submitted application is complete, accurate and meets the 2025 GLOWS Medium Grant Guidelines.

Completed applications, including any supporting documentation, must be submitted on or before the due date.

**No late applications will be considered.**

## 4.1 Eligibility criteria

### 4.1.1 *Who should consider this Medium Grant opportunity?*

There is no requirement for formal research qualifications, however it is important that you have a clear and comprehensive research project proposal that supports your organisation in undertaking the work, and that this outlines how you plan to carry out the proposed research. This document will also serve as a supporting document if you require ethics approval for your research project.

It is a condition of the GLOWS Medium Grant stream that funding supports Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander researchers, community-controlled organisations or projects led by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community controlled organisations are

encouraged to apply for funding themselves, or in partnership with other appropriate organisations and/or institutions.

#### *4.1.2 Who is eligible to apply?*

**To be eligible to apply, applicants must meet the following criteria:**

- An Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander person must be leading the research. A non-Indigenous person can be the project lead but not the chief investigator.
- An Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community controlled organisation or a non-Indigenous organisation partnering with an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community controlled organisation are eligible to apply.
- Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community controlled organisations who wish to apply must have an Incorporation Number and be governed by a board with majority Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander members (above 51%), who have been elected by the local Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community.
- Institutions or organisations applying must have an Australian Business Number (ABN). The Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community controlled organisation must have an Australian Business Number (ABN) or Indigenous Business Number (IBN), including an account with an Australian financial institution.
- The institution or organisation must have no outstanding reports, acquittals or serious breaches relating to any Australian Government funding (a serious breach might be one that has resulted in termination of a grant agreement).
- The institution or organisation must not be bankrupt or subject to insolvency proceedings.
- The institution or organisation must have the available resources and ability to undertake a research project in accordance with the GLOWS Medium Grant Terms and Conditions of the Contract.
- The grant must not be more than 33 per cent of the organisation's revenue.

**Applicants also must maintain at all times, and provide evidence of:**

- Certificates of Currency for Public Liability insurance to a minimum \$10 million in respect of any claim or series of related claims
- Professional Indemnity insurance to a minimum \$10 million in respect of any claim or series of related claims
- Worker's Compensation insurance for all employees and sub-contractors involved in delivery of the services.

#### *4.1.3 Who is not eligible to apply?*

Lowitja Institute will not accept applications from the following:

- If your organisation is already in receipt of funding under the GLOWS Grant Program 2024–26.
- Individuals and consultants.
- For-profit organisations, including Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander businesses.
- Federal and state government agencies and bodies.
- Public schools.
- Unincorporated Aboriginal organisations or groups.
- Organisations that have not met project requirements, including acquittal and reporting for grant funding received in the previous two years, and auspice organisations.

## **4.2 Eligible grant activities**

### *4.2.1 What can the grant funds be used for?*

Funding provided through the GLOWS Grant Program must be spent on costs that are directly associated with the requirements of the grant. These activities include expenses such as:

- the engagement of researchers, consultants, specialists, experts, or contractors/ stakeholders directly related to delivering the project
- project administration (a maximum of 20 per cent of total grant money) for items such as project management, report writing, book-keeping, audits, and financial management
- facilitation of workshops and/or community meetings including Lowitja Institute capability and research training
- domestic travel for researchers to engage with the community and key stakeholder for the project
- project specific resources and equipment applicable to the project
- reimbursement for participants in the research
- capability and research training.

#### *4.2.2 What the grant money cannot be used for*

##### **The grant does not fund:**

- activities of the organisation that are already funded by government bodies or are part of their normal responsibilities
- activities for which other Commonwealth, state, territory or local government bodies have primary responsibility (including program delivery, language revitalisation, native title claims research)
- biomedical or clinical projects that do not include a significant Indigenous social or cultural research emphasis (these would normally be referred to the NHMRC for consideration)
- capital works and purchases, including purchases of land or buildings.
- purchasing of equipment (computers, projectors etc)
- operational funding or ongoing administration and employment within an organisation
- activities with a primarily commercial focus or intent

- activities with a political or lobbying focus or intent
- costs incurred in preparation of a grant application or related documentation
- international travel (approval must be sought from Lowitja Institute in writing).

### 4.3 Chief investigator/project lead

A **chief investigator** is referred to as the individual that takes the overall responsibility of the research project. They take lead on implementing the design, reporting of the study, and assisting in the conduct and production of the research. The Chief Investigator for the GLOWS Medium Grant is required to be an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander person.


A **project lead** is the person who takes the day-to-day responsibility of the project management and progresses the research project to its full potential. It is expected that an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander person is also the project lead; however, a non-Indigenous person can be nominated.

You will not be eligible for the GLOWS Medium Grant if you do not meet these criteria.

### 4.4 Research project details and summary

In your application, we want to understand all aspects of your research project and how it is going to be undertaken. Please detail:

- a. a clear project title for your research, with a short summary (300 words) of your project and its aim. This should be a short overview that will be placed on the website if you are successful for a GLOWS Medium Grant.
- b. a start date and end date of your project. The project runs for one year, the project completion date must be on or before 31 January 2027.
- c. ONE chosen GLOWS Program funding priority and how your project directly relates to this priority.

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- d. what type of research your project is. This includes but not limited to:
- **feasibility:** a small-scale study that is used to evaluate the success of a program or research project in order to conduct a bigger-scale project in the future or implement the program permanently.
  - **implementation:** this is the process of applying research knowledge, results and/or outcomes into practice through the carrying out of a policy, program, or an intervention.
  - **evaluation:** this is the assessment or appraisal of a program, practice, activity, or system that currently exists in the organisation. This evaluation will then provide information that will be used to make further decisions on the practice and changes.
  - **discovery:** this is a project to create or build new knowledge. This occurs through examining and mapping data to find questions or imperfections that have not been identified or are not yet answered, to provide further context to start a new research project.
  - **exploratory:** this study design is a way to explore or investigate a problem to better understand it and produce results and ideas on how to change or fix it. This can be conducted as yarning interviews or circles with community or research participants (qualitative study).
- e. what area of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander health and wellbeing your research is focused on. This includes the population demographic.
- f. a detailed description of how your project will benefit Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and community. Including how this is a priority area for your organisation and how Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people are involved.
- g. an understanding of the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities and geographical location that the research project will be conducted. Including how this will make change and impact for our peoples.

- h. a detailed description of how you will develop a knowledge translation plan as part of this project, including how the community will be provided with feedback regarding research outcomes and next steps.
- i. a three to five-page overall project proposal and plan of your research. This proposal is also a supporting document for an ethics application.

Applicants can access resources on our website, to support the completion of the project details and summary of the application.

## 4.5 Organisation capacity

**As part of your application, you will be required to** provide a copy of your organisation's most-recent financial year's Annual Report. **If this cannot be provided,** a recent audited financial statement **may be submitted in its place (for example, Profit and Loss Statement, Statement of Financial Performance, or Balance Sheet).**

In your application we would also like to understand:

- how your project team supports Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander involvement throughout the project
- how many Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people will be employed on this project
- how the research project will contribute to the development of the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander health research workforce
- if your organisation would like support and/or training in research, and capability building of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander staff.

## 4.6 Ethics

All organisations applying for funding in the 2025 GLOWS Medium Grant round must follow the following National Health and Medical Research Council's (NHMRC) guidelines:

- [Ethical conduct in research with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples and communities: Guidelines for Researchers and Stakeholders \(2018\)](#)

The NHMRC's *National Statement on Ethical Conduct in Human Research* notes that human participation in research includes the involvement of human beings through:

- taking part in surveys, interviews or focus groups
- undergoing psychological, physiological, or medical testing or treatment
- being observed by researchers
- researchers having access to their personal documents or other materials
- the collection and use of their body organs, tissues, or fluids (for example, skin, blood, urine, saliva, hair, bones, tumour, and other biopsy specimens) or their exhaled breath
- access to their information (in individually identifiable, re-identifiable or non-identifiable form) as part of an existing published or unpublished source or database.

For projects that require human research ethics approval, the provision of grant money is subject to obtaining approval, where possible through an Aboriginal Human Research Ethics Committee (HREC). If a project requiring ethics approval fails to obtain it, the project cannot proceed, and allocated grant money will be reacquired.

**We ask you to specify which ethics approval/s you intend to seek, in your application. Research projects that consider Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander-specific human research ethics approvals and local governance processes are preferred.**

We recommend you review and consider the following resources:

## 4.7 Budget

Each GLOWS Medium Grant will be a maximum of \$300,000 over a period of maximum 12 months. This means you must complete your research project within 12 months of the project's commencement date.

The grant budget can include activities from the 'Eligible grant activities' section of this guidelines document. We recommend that you review this section before completing your budget for the application. We have also provided a [budget guide](#) which includes a criteria of budget expenses we expect to see.

## 5.0 Delivery of grant activities

Once the project has started and your grant money has been allocated, there are responsibilities that is required to be upheld by each successful organisation.

Your responsibilities include but are not limited to:

- obtaining and maintaining ethical clearance and reporting obligations to the relevant HREC
- meeting the terms and conditions of the grant agreement and managing the activity efficiently and effectively
- complying with record keeping, reporting and acquittal requirements as set out in the grant agreement
- providing copies of all reports and project outputs to Lowitja Institute. Reporting will be in SmartyGrants and Lowitja Institute will provide template for you to complete
- adhering to the contracts, terms and conditions, including having a full understand of what criteria are outlined in the contract and what you can use your funds for appropriately.

**We will expect you to report on:**

- progress against agreed key deliverables

- achievement against performance indicators
- eligible expenditure of grant funds
- closure of the project
- impact of the project
- an audit on financials.

## **6.0 Application support**
